Professor Katherine Paugh

Fellow and Tutor at Corpus Christi College, Associate Professor of Atlantic World Women's History at the Department of History, University of Oxford. 
George Palmer

Prof. Antoniades' interest lies in examining the neurobiological relationship between visual perception. Based on her research, she runs lecture series on innovation and leadership.

Dr Ridley graduated from the University of Oxford in Law. Since then he has obtained Bachelor degrees and Master's degrees in Sociology, Criminology and Psychology, and now often works with representatives and advisors at the UK Parliament. He now works as a trained UK barrister focusing on animal rights in London.



James Campbell

Mr Campbell is a researcher at the Centre for Socio-Legal Studies at the University of Oxford. His research, under the supervision of Professor Linda Mulcahy, explores the significance of physical movement within the court building. He is also an Associate Lecturer in Law, Society and Culture.

Collaborating with chemists from the University of Tokyo, Dion is currently studying the charge transport and thermoelectric properties of coordination nanosheets, an emerging class of two-dimensional metal-organic frameworks exhibiting curious electronic properties.



Professor Ewan Smith

During his PhD, Prof. Smith became interested in how sensory neurones are activated by acid and the apparent inactivity in naked mole rats. His research was funded by famous the Alexander von Humboldt Foundation. He is now a Fellow of Corpus Christi College where he supervises second-'year medicine undergraduates.

Lecture Preparation





Eagle

Afternoon Tea

The British will only give themselves the opportunity to enjoy afternoon tea in a restaurant on a special big day. High-standard English afternoon tea is not as common in every household as fish and chips or English breakfast, but this does not affect the heritage of afternoon tea culture in the UK. English afternoon tea not only exists in high-end restaurants, in the homes of ordinary people in the UK, afternoon tea is more of an attitude to life. At four o'clock in the afternoon, people will put down their work and give themselves a cup of tea. Even if the cup is just a cheap tea bag from the supermarket, and the plate is just a simple two biscuits. The English writer Henry James once said: "There are few hours in life more agreeable than the hour dedicated to the ceremony known as afternoon tea."



Formal Dinner

Formal Hall is a tradition that only happens in Oxford and Cambridge University. This is a chance for you to dress in your most formal clothes (suits and dresses) and have a 3-course dinner in the dining room of an Oxford and Cambridge University college. To prepare for the customs and traditions that will be followed, you will have a 'British Etiquette' lesson before the dinner.
